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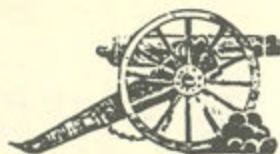
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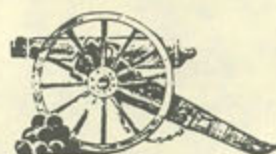

Things to See and What to Do in . . . GEORGIA

In October the weather in Georgia should be delightful. Moderate daytime temperatures with cool nights. The fall foliage should be at its peak at this time.

Following the meetings perhaps you would like to see other sights . . .

Suggestions of where to go and what to see in ATLANTA:

Six Flags Over Georgia: 12 miles west of downtown Atlanta — a family entertainment center with rides, shows and attractions.

Stone Mountain: A 3,200 acre family recreation park surrounding the world's largest granite monolith, world's largest work of sculptural art, antebellum plantation, scenic railroad, river boats, skylift, camping, historic trails, fishing and boating.

Fox Theater: Opulent detailed 1929 movie palace, 4,000 seat theater and three grand ballrooms for parties, conventions and performances. Also guided tours.

Botanical Garden: Located in Piedmont Park.

Edgewood Candler Park: Planetarium, observation exhibit hall, walking forest and reference library.

Toy — 2800 Peachtree N.E.: Over 100,000 toys dating from the early 1800's.

Gone With the Wind Gallery: 152 Nassau St. N.W. Memorabilia, theatrical props, posters, first editions of the novel, souvenirs from the movie premier and photographs.

The Northwest Corner: Rich in Indian lore, filled with reminders of the culture and traditions of some of Georgia's earliest settlers. **Rock City** is a spectacular view of the entire region at the top of Lookout Mountain.

Northeast Mountains: Earth meets the sky, waterfalls rush to fill nearby streams in miles of untouched natural forest, a scenic highway winds around glassy lakes, running with the colorful wild flowers and breathtaking in simple glory. Attractions here are closely attuned to the outdoors. This is the place to hunt Indian relics, hang glide or join a white water canoeing expedition.

Golden Shoreline: In 1733 General James Edward Oglethorpe and a small band of English colonists arrived at what is now the city of Savannah. The lifestyle of the early days is still clearly reflected here. Augusta is a short distance north of Savannah. Here you will see beauty, elegance, tradition, honor of the classic south as well as the home of Augusta Masters.

There is also Brunswick, Sea Island and St. Simons Island to name a few places where you can enjoy sun-drenched beaches that are a favorite spot for swimming, sunning and fishing.

You may even want to travel a bit farther to **New Orleans**. Here you will have the opportunity to get in on the last few weeks of the FAIR. If interested call (504) 525-FAIR or by writing to Louisiana World Exposition, Inc., Box 1984, New Orleans, LA 70158.

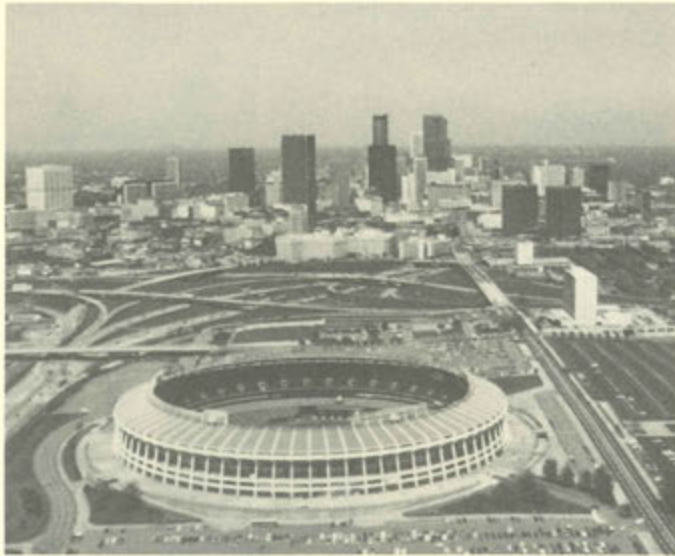

An elegant tour of two very famous Georgia houses. The Swan House, built in 1928 for a prominent Atlanta family. It features luxurious interiors, splendid collection of furnishings and award-winning gardens. The Tullie Smith House adjoins the Swan House. This is one of the few remaining pre-civil war homes in Atlanta. Lunch will be served for the ladies at the Swan Coach House. After lunch there will be time for browsing in the Coach House Gift Shop and Craft Shop. Returning to the hotel to join the entire group for the **Afternoon Tour:** 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Combining Southern heritage with the sophistication of an international city, this tour will show Atlanta past and present. The tour begins with the downtown district — it will include a drive past the world's tallest hotel, the Omni International Complex, Rich's, the State Capitol (crowned with gold from the Georgia mountains), and the Sweet Auburn section. We will then visit the Cyclorama, a unique memorial. It is a painting in the round (50 feet high and 400 feet in circumference) with three dimensional figures, sound, light effects and narration to relive a day in the 1864 Civil War. The last stop will be Atlanta's new High Museum of Art Building. This outstanding architectural achievement has been featured in *Newsweek*, *New York Times*, *Museum News*, *Southern Living* and *Smithsonian*. It is clearly called "spectacular".

The Banquet will be in the Hotel Ballroom. We will be entertained during the social hour by members of the Atlanta Pipe Band. Following dinner we will have a performance by "Buckwheat" (you guess) and a delightful after-dinner talk by our own "Corky" Carnahan. A fun-filled evening.
