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# What to Expect When Submitting Your Research

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## **You've submitted your research. What are the next steps?**

Congratulations on submitting your research to JAPMA, the official award-winning journal of the American Podiatric Medical Association. After you submit your manuscript for consideration, your paper will undergo quality check and peer review. Most papers also undergo revision. Accepted papers enter the production stage and then are published.

### **Quality Check**

After you submit your manuscript, our editorial team conducts a quality check to ensure that all files are complete. If anything is missing or needs fixing, you will receive an e-mail listing the items to be addressed. Once your manuscript passes the QC stage, it is sent to Warren S. Joseph, DPM, editor of JAPMA.

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# Types of Articles in JAPMA

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JAPMA publishes a variety of manuscript types. Refer to the chart below for more information.

Type of Manuscript	Description	Abstract Structure
Original Article	A research study or other substantive paper suitable for the "main" section of the journal.	Structured if original research
Topics in Podiatric Medical Education	Articles focused on podiatric medical education. For more information, visit <a href="http://www.japmaonline.org">www.japmaonline.org</a> .	Structured if original research
Basic Science Review	A review of a basic science area relevant to podiatric medicine.	Unstructured
Clinical Pharmacology	Pharmacology-focused paper.	Unstructured
Clinically Speaking	A brief case report.	Unstructured
Clinically Illustrated	A demonstration of a new technique or procedure, with a focus on photographs and illustrations.	Unstructured
Clinical Pathology	A brief paper focusing on histopathologic analysis.	Unstructured
Clinical Correspondence	A short piece in the style of a "letter to colleagues," designed to alert readers to an important or interesting finding or development.	No abstract
Special Communication	A paper on a nonclinical or unusual topic, sometimes written by a nonpodiatrist.	Unstructured
Letter to the Editor	A letter intended for publication, published with response from original paper's author.	No abstract
